A Message from Canadian Valley Electric CEO

Cooperatives Move Forward as Governments Stall

In March 2020, the world received a wake-up call on the crucial role of broadband services in driving economies. By June of that year, Canadian Valley Electric began exploring how the cooperative business model could help bridge the digital divide. By July, we took action to establish a new subsidiary, and by early fall, CVEC Fiber was formed, setting the wheels in motion for progress. Today, we have successfully connected over 6,500 rural members, and we are more than 60% complete in our mission to bring high-speed broadband to all Canadian Valley Electric members.

In response to the urgent need for improved connectivity, the federal government swiftly passed legislation for pandemic relief and made historic investments in broadband infrastructure. The American Rescue Plan (ARPA) allocated over \$3 billion of funding to Oklahoma, with \$382 million designated for broadband initiatives. The Department of Treasury also earmarked an extra \$167 million through the Capital Projects Fund for broadband in Oklahoma. The National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) awarded over \$212 million for broadband projects in tribal nations within the state. Most recently, the Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) program has allocated over \$797 million to Oklahoma for broadband infrastructure. In total, there is over \$1.5 billion in available funding dedicated to broadband infrastructure across Oklahoma, enough to bring fiber to every corner of the state.

Unfortunately, a significant portion of these allocated funds remains unutilized. The "emergency" funding programs like BEAD are unlikely to disburse any money before late 2024, and the utilization of ARPA funds is currently stalled at the state level. Witnessing such delays in addressing what was deemed an urgent matter is disheartening. Nevertheless, we remain committed to forging ahead.

In the 1940s, electric cooperatives stepped up to bring electricity to underserved areas. Today, several cooperatives in Oklahoma, including Canadian Valley Electric, are undertaking a similar mission with broadband. It is a story that echoes the past.

The challenge in broadband deployment lies outside of funding, as an ample amount is available. Instead, it is a matter of politics. Our elected officials should allocate funds to entities with a proven track record of capability and successful implementation.

Easy Ways to Pay Your CVEC Fiber Bill or Report an Issue or Outage

There are several ways to pay your CVEC Fiber bill or submit a trouble ticket. CVEC Fiber's Digital Marketing Associate Kelsey Scott states, "We strive to make accessing your bill and reaching technical support a quick and easy experience."

1. SmartHub App

To make online payments, SmartHub is the place! The SmartHub App homepage shows your account overview with a red pay button. Click "Pay," select your fiber account, choose the payment amount and the date, select your payment method, and click "Confirm." You will receive a confirmation number. As of June 22, there is now a link to submit fiber trouble tickets in the SmartHub App! When you log in to SmartHub on the homepage, there are three links with icons. In order, the icons are the Canadian Valley Electric Outage Map (Map Icon), Report Fiber Issue (Computer Icon), and Electralite (Newspaper Icon). Clicking the "Report Fiber Issue" icon takes you directly to our CVEC Fiber Support Center. In the Support Center, you can submit a ticket that goes directly to our technicians or check the status of a ticket you submitted.

2. CVEC Fiber Website

The CVEC Fiber website at www.cvecfiber.com has tons of information and tools to help you! To pay your CVEC Fiber bill on our website, there is an account icon on the home page, and the link will take you to your SmartHub account to make a payment. If you need to submit a trouble ticket or report an outage on the top header of the CVEC Fiber website, there is a tab called Technical Support. The Technical Support page has an orange button labeled "Submit a Trouble Ticket." When you click the button, it takes you to the CVEC Fiber Support Center. Also, on the Technical Support page, there are several common questions we have answered, so be sure to check them out!

3. CVEC Fiber App

Right now, you cannot make payments on the CVEC Fiber App. However, in the CVEC Fiber App, click on the settings button, then under the contact support tab, the CVEC Fiber contact information is listed, including the website URL to our CVEC Fiber support center. The CVEC Fiber app has many neat tools, such as setting up a guest network, parental controls, and monitoring devices.
