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# CANADIAN VALLEY ELECTRALITE CVEC Cancels Annual Meeting Amid Pandemic

What a year it has been! Like everyone, we have been busy adapting to the changes brought on by the pandemic and the ever-changing legislative environment that has accompanied it. Following an initial decision to postpone our annual meeting, we have now determined it is in the best

interest of the cooperative and the community that we cancel our 2020 annual meeting.

This is not a decision we made lightly. Our decision to cancel annual meeting was made after much debate regarding the pros and cons of conducting an event that has historically been a sizable public gathering. We considered alternatives including a scaled down business-only meeting, a drive-through registration option, and a virtual online meeting.

As I write this, coronavirus cases in Oklahoma are still alarmingly high and we do not feel it would be prudent to hold a large gathering in a year that does not present any pressing bylaw changes or business requiring a vote by the cooperative membership. The health, safety, and well-being of our community is the larger concern.

We are still providing you the operating results from 2019 and will be leveraging alternate communication channels as much as possible to provide updates on the activities of the cooperative.

Although we have made some changes to our operations, including lobby closures, remote

appointments, and social distancing measures, rest assured we are still moving forward with all planned maintenance activities and are fully staffed to provide the same outage restoration services you are accustomed to. The staff at Canadian Valley is working hard to drive efficiency improvements in both our operations and member service areas and developing plans for a smarter electric distribution grid.

Be safe, be well, and I look forward to seeing you next year, at our 2021 annual meeting.

# Teach Energy Efficiency to Young Ones While at Home this Fall

When everyone is spending more time at home this fall, the lights, computers and TV are running almost all the time.

That's perfectly fine if family members are in the rooms where those devices are switched on. But it's a waste of energy if lights and electronics are on when nobody's around.

The best way to get your children to avoid wasting electricity is to point out how your family could do better and engage them in the cure. Some examples:

• Buy LED light bulbs for your lamps and overhead fixtures, and challenge your kids to replace all of the less-efficient bulbs with these. Residential LEDs use 75% less energy and last 25 times longer 702250900 than incandescent bulbs.

• If you don't have a programmable thermostat yet, assign one of your kids—someone who can reach the thermostat—the job of turning it up at bedtime by about 7 degrees if the air conditioning is still out or down about 7 degrees if the heat is on. Do it every evening and you could save up to 10% on heating.

# **Choose Efficient Appliances When Replacing Old Ones**

The federal government's Energy Star program marks the most-efficient household appliances with a special label so shoppers know which appliances will save them money on their utility bills.

The label tells consumers how much it will cost—energy-wise—to operate the unit. Most of the time, Energy Star appliances save at least 15% compared with products that don't qualify for the Energy Star label, and some save as much as 60%.

A variety of appliance manufacturers make devices that qualify for Energy Star.

Here's a list of how much energy you can save if you select Energy Star appliances next time yours need replacing:

• Energy Star-rated clothes dryers use about 20% less energy than other models, saving you \$215 over their lifetime.

• Room air purifiers or cleaners with the Energy Star label are almost 60% more energy efficient than standard models. Those savings can add up to \$60 a year on utility bills, according to Energy Star.

• Clothes dryers in the program use about 25% less energy and 33% less water than regular washers. Lifetime savings can be as high as \$370.

• Efficient humidifiers use nearly 15% less energy than standard models. • A new, Energy Star-certified dishwasher will cost just about \$35 a year to run and will save an average of 3,870 gallons of water over its lifetime.

• A stand-alone freezer with the label is at least 10% more energy efficient than federal regulations require. Old freezers use way more energy than newer ones, so replacing yours with an Energy Star model could save up to \$195 in energy bills over five years.

• Likewise, newer refrigerators are more efficient than old ones. Energy Star-certified new refrigerators are about 9% more efficient than new refrigerators that simply meet minimum federal requirements.

## **Cooperative Members Help their Neighbors**

The word "cooperative" in the context of "electric cooperative" means your utility is organized as a cooperative business; that is, it is owned by the consumers who buy its services.

It also means something else. One of any cooperative's guiding principles is "cooperation among cooperatives," which means if a nearby electric cooperative needs help, yours will gladly pitch in.

Likewise the consumer-owners of the cooperative have a proud history of helping each other during hard times—like these.

During the pandemic, your neighbors have been helping each other out by:

• Checking in on elderly neighbors or those who live alone to ask if they need anything.

• Doubling up on grocery shopping so they can pick up food for those who can't get out—as long as they're going to the store anyway.

• Sewing cute masks and distributing them to people who can't find any or can't afford 1102300604 to buy them.

• Lending a shoulder to cry on or a friendly ear to bend for neighbors who are down on their luck or feeling extra stress during the pandemic. It's a great way to show your cooperative spirit. What else can you do to help your fellow electric cooperative members?

October is National Cooperative Month. Show your cooperative spirit this month by pitching in around your own neighborhood to show that we're all in this together.
